Dear Readers

As I write this I am indoors, curtains drawn, fan on and attempting to stay cool in the third heatwave of 2025.

We are now in the midst of the holiday season and many of us will be taking a summer break from work, spending time with family and friends. The children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren are now enjoying well deserved rest from school, college and university studies.

In our church calendar we are in a period called "ordinary time". There are two periods of ordinary time in the year and these are the periods that are not major seasons like Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter.

They are times for spiritual growth, times to focus on the mystery of Christ. A time for deepening our prayer life and an opportunity for discerning the next steps in our lives and on our journey of faith.

The Latin word *ordinalis* means "showing order, denoting an order of succession". The seasons mark out the year and this is especially noticeable in the beautiful rural area in which we live.

August is the time for celebration. We see the golden fields full of ripening cereal crops and celebrate the Christian festival of Lammas using a loaf of bread made from the grain of the first harvest of wheat. Apples, pears and plums are ripening, summer fêtes are taking place and the nights are warm, filled with the sounds of creation and the smell of barbecues.

So these times are not "ordinary times" in a mundane way and neither does the term "ordinary" imply dullness or routine. The colour we use in church and the priest stole is green, symbolizing growth and new life.

So may I encourage you in this ordinary time to take a moment to give thanks for the not so ordinary times in our lives and celebrate these amazing yet simple gifts we have been given.

May you all manage to keep cool.

Alpaca facts

Two alpacas live in the field next to our house. They belong to our neighbour but I love to watch them bending elegantly down to graze or stretching up their long necks for the tastiest leaves in the hedge. They look up curiously as I pass and give me a haughty stare.

They share the field with a flock of sheep and, at the

moment, some skittish lambs. In their native South America they are sometimes kept as herd guardians, to protect other livestock from predators, but I don't know how effective these two



Alpacas (lama pacos) are South American camelids, smaller than llamas with a slender body, small head and large pointed ears. They known for their soft, luxurious fleece. They are gentle and sociable and relatively easy to handle so are often kept as pets or for trekking. They are generally very

trainable and respond to rewards, like food. They can usually be petted without getting agitated, especially if you avoid stroking the head or neck.

Alpacas have been domesticated for thousands of years and are native to the Andes in South America, specifically Peru, Chile, Bolivia and Ecuador. They are ruminants, like cows and sheep and don't have upper front teeth so they are gentle grazers. They communicate in various ways, including humming, clucking and grumbling. They also spit to show dominance when distressed or agitated, and can spit up to ten feet if they need to, so look out! When they are interested, they tend to sniff their surroundings and watch closely or stand quietly and stare.



John Tovey's Ice Box Pudding



This is a special occasion pud so don't raise your hands in horror at the ingredients! It is well worth it and feeds 20 or more. Split the mixture into smaller moulds/loaf tins if you don't want to use it all at once: it keeps well in the freezer.

Ingredients

6 eggs, separated 225g (8 oz) castor sugar, sieved 1 litre (1.5 pints) double cream Flavour of your choice (see below) Approx 300g plain biscuit crumbs

Whisk the egg yolks at high speed and gradually add spoonfuls of castor sugar. Then whisk in your

Whip the double cream (don't over whip) and bring the two mixtures together in a large bowl using a long-handled spoon.

Beat the egg whites until stiff then fold into the mixture, adding one-third first and then twothirds.

Crush the biscuits with a rolling pin or in a food processor and line your moulds/tins. Pour in the mixture, top with crumbs and freeze for 12 hours. Thaw for 10 minutes before serving.

Flavours

Coffee: add 2 tablespoons of very strong coffee to the basic mixture.

Lemon or orange: add finely grated rind and strained juice of 2 lemons or 2 oranges to the basic mixture.

Invent your own flavours! Add Cointreau over the orange before serving; and Baileys over the coffee!

Who's sorry now?



My newspaper recently carried the obituary of Concetta Rosa Maria Franconero who died on 17th July at the age of 87. Older readers may know her better as Connie Francis. She was a huge American pop star in the late 1950s but her style of singing was overtaken by more lively performers like Elvis Presley and later by the Beatles and the whole revolution of social mores in the 1960s.

Her songs, like "Who's sorry now?" and "Lipstick on your collar", no longer suited modern tastes. Her era of teenage innocence was firmly kicked into touch by 1965.

I also read that the voting age in England is to be lowered to 16 for the next election, which set me thinking about the history of voting in the UK. Parliamentarians had been chosen by votes in one form or another since Magna Carta in the 1200s but nearly two hundred years ago, in 1832, Earl Grey (the famous tea man) expanded the franchise to about 600,000 people – men (not women) over the age of 21 who were also freeholders.

In 1867 and 1884 more people were added to the franchise to vote, but still men only. In 1918 women could vote for the first time, but they had to own a property so by no means all of them were included. Finally in 1928 further reform gave the vote to all men and women over the age of 21. The Peoples Act of 1969 reduced the voting age to 18.

I don't doubt that today's teenagers are much more worldly wise than their predecessors in the 1950s although they may be more open to influencers on social media or even, God forbid, "fake news" I don't suppose they are more or less wise than the rest of the population regarding their political insights.

A sign in a local dentist's waiting room says "Employ a teenager while they still know everything". Churchill is alleged to have said, "Democracy is the worst form of government, except for all the others".

So we will wait and see if these additional voters make for better government.

Or will we all be singing "Who's sorry now?" Brian Griffiths



Teme Valley Wildlife

Nash church is a fourteenth century church with a square stone tower, chancel and nave. It is currently raising money for essential repairs and as part of its fundraising activities invited the Teme Valley Wildlife Group to help advertise its treasures. The treasures in question were not those inside, but those lying in the green space sur-



Nash lies to the north of Burford and was once a chapel of the church there. It is situated half-way up to the Clee Hill, but originally had no burial ground, so the current churchyard is considerably younger than the stones of the church. The ground was provided by a local landowner when the church finally became the centre of a parish of its own.

Like many churchyards, the grass around the church is designated as "unimproved grassland".




This means that it has not had chemical fertilisers, weedkillers or pesticides applied to it. Grassland allowed to grow until haymaking time, then cut and subsequently mown or grazed, allows a wide variety of plants and grasses to flourish and to create a high-nourishment hay crop. Grasses within such systems are finer and shorter than

unmanaged grassland in waste places, and flowers can flourish and set seed, which leads to a wide variety of plants all growing harmoniously together. Such habitats attract insects, which in turn attract birds, bats and small mammals.

Members of the group surveyed plants, grasses and trees, birds, moths and butterflies and general insects. Generously fortified with hot drinks and home-made biscuits they set about producing lists of what they had identified. I particularly enjoyed seeing lady's bedstraw, hoary plantain and quaking grass in the sward and we found healthy-looking elm in the hedge surround-

ing the churchyard. No plant was particularly rare, but the group of flowering plants and grasses taken together represents an increasingly rare type of habitat, one which is of great natural value.

The Group's most exciting find was a small red bullet-shaped beetle which proved to be rather unusual. The red-horned Cardinal Click Beetle gets its name from being as red as the robes of a traditional church cardinal, and from making an audible "click" when flinging itself into the air to avoid predators. I think it highly appropriate that our rarest find bears a "holy" name.
