

Each box of 100 ducks is then put into numbered bags, checked and double checked to make sure each ticket we sell is allocated to a duck. During this process we expect there to be a lot of cleaning of ducks, laughing and counting."

It all began around Jessica Middleton's kitchen table at Bank Farm. In the autumn of 2011, after losing her husband, Jessica began to realise the loneliness that several people she knew, partic-

ularly farmers living alone, must feel. So she invited four of them to lunch and they all enjoyed excellent camaraderie over the meal. Then the vicar said that she should open it up to everybody, so she did and it became a regular monthly event. The Neighbourhood Lunch was born.

Numbers gradually built up; the meetings were obviously enjoyed by

all, and it filled a need in the community that was not covered by any other initiative. It was a great success. And then, to cap it all and generate formal recognition, they were awarded a Group MBE in Her Majesty's Honours List.

At its zenith about 70 meals were served; the cooks coped, but rather reduced numbers today of between 30 and 40 make it much easier for everyone and some days, like Christmas and Easter, can be made even more special with cards, flowers and small gifts. Everyone enjoys each other's company and a good home cooked meal, over which stories of the past are recalled and new friendships

keep postage down Jessica walked miles to deliver copies, much to the satisfaction of her dogs (!) and it also inspired Mr Thom to increase his distributions to the elderly.

The original area covered Stoke Bliss and Kyre but today there

are souls from Tenbury Wells and Bromyard as well. Friends from from Sutton Coldfield have also visited! The cooks can cater for dietary anomalies - gluten free, vegetarian etc - provided they are given enough notice. At (currently) £8.50 a two course meal, a glass of an alcoholic nature or other beverage and a cup of coffee or tea is excellent value.

But it is the friendship, the bonhomie and the social connections that are the primary function of this regular event. For some, the second Thursday of each month is a highlight to look forward to and the group does its best to keep it that way. As Jessica says, "If you are a regular and know anybody who would benefit please bring them along; after thirteen years we feel that we must have got it right and filled a significant need in our scattered community.

Rhubarb cakes

Make the most of tender new rhubarb with these zingy cakes, which also make great desserts.

Ingredients

300 g rhubarb Juice of ½ lemon 165 g self-raising flour 175 g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing 175 g caster sugar 3 large free-range eggs 2 tsp vanilla extract

For the topping

25 g unsalted butter 2 tbsp self-raising flour 1 tbsp caster sugar 2 tsp ground ginger 1 tbsp icing sugar, to dust 4 tbsp crème fraîche, to serve 2 tbsp clear honey, to serve

Method

Preheat the oven to 180° C/gas mark 4. Grease a 23cm square cake tin and line with baking parchment.

Trim the rhubarb and chop into 3cm pieces. Place



in a bowl with the lemon juice. In a separate bowl, beat together the flour, butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla extract. Fold in half the rhubarb and spoon the mixture into the bottom of the tin, spreading it out with a spatula. Scatter over the remaining rhubarb.

For the topping, rub the butter into the flour, then stir in the sugar and ginger. Sprinkle over the cake mixture and bake for 40-50 minutes. Leave to cool for 10 minutes, then remove from the tin. Dust with icing sugar, then slice into squares.

Serve warm or cold with crème fraîche, drizzled with honey.

Cricket - balls, batters and a soggy ground

Now the monsoon has relented and spring is on the way we have seen the Boat Race and the Grand National. And best of all the cricket season has started.

It's a bit odd this year.

Normally the pitches are sticky wickets, the ball holds back after bouncing and batters (no longer batsmen) play too early and spoon the ball in the air to be caught. Not this year though – runs have been plentiful and bowlers exhausted. A chap named Northeast (who comes originally from Kent in the south east but now plays for Glamorgan in the south west) made a score of 335 not out at Lords in the first week of April.

The main problem is that if you cannot bowl out a team you cannot win a match. There are 18 first class county teams and each has played two games, so there have been 18 games so far. To date one team has won one game and one team has lost one game. All 17 other games have ended in draws.

"Oh, the weather has been bad" I hear you say – but no. Most games have achieved at least three days' play despite weather interruptions. The explanation, I understand, is the new ball. It is called a Kookaburra.

Kookaburra is an Australian sports equipment company based in Melbourne, Australia. The company was founded in 1890 and makes equipment for Australian rules football, cricket and field hockey. The company is named after the Australian bird, the kookaburra. Their ball replaces the Duke ball which has been used in county cricket for over 100 years.

The Kookaburra ball is made in a factory by machines whereas the Duke ball is hand made by English artisans; it is made in London by British Cricket Balls Ltd, a sports equipment company currently owned by Indian businessman Dilip Jajodia. The ball was first manufactured by the Duke family in around 1760.

The critical difference is that the seam is higher on the Duke ball so bowlers may swing their deliveries in the air and gain some small advantage over the batters. This is more interesting than trying to watch drawn games in cold weather wrapped in many layers of clothing.

Locally, the Worcester ground is now free of water and may be ready for play by June. There is some effort to move the whole enterprise to higher ground away from the shadow of the cathedral. Meanwhile home games are to be played in Kidderminster

Here's hoping for a dry summer.

Citizens Advice South Worcestershire Flexible working

If you are working for an employer, did you know that you might have the opportunity to request flexible working?

If you are finding it hard to balance your work life with other commitments, you could consider asking to work flexibly. This means asking your employer to work in a different way from the way you work at present. This could mean changing how long you work, or when you start and finish work, or changing the place where you work, for example, working from home for one day a week or doing a Job share. The change may be permanent or temporary.

Many people will not be aware that there are changes to rules around statutory flexible working requests coming into force on 6th April 2024.

Under the new rules, if you make a statutory request (which can be done from day one of starting work):

• The employer has two months to make a decision, unless otherwise agreed with the employee

• Employees can make two requests in a twelve month period

• The employee will no longer have to explain the effect they think the request will have on the employer, and how any such effect might be dealt with

• An employer can't refuse a request unless the



employee has been consulted

Your employer should write to you to explain why they've turned down your request. They should also tell you about their appeals process if they have one.

It's best to use your employer's appeal process if you can. If your employer doesn't have an appeals process, you can raise a grievance or you can ask them to review their decision. If your employer doesn't change their decision, you might be able to take your employer to an employment tribunal.

Teme Valley Wildlife

The patch of grass in front of my house slopes down to the hedge bordering the village lane. It is regularly mowed but can in no way be described as a lawn. It is irregular, uneven and never likely to host Wimbledon-style stripes. Instead, daisies, buttercups and dandelions flourish there and multiple colonies of yellow meadow ants labour ceaselessly to raise their tumps above its surface. The area is damp and waterlogged and its greenness owes more to moss than grass.



In old maps the patch is described as an orchard and pig-run. The pigsty is still there but sadly most of the fruit trees are long since gone. One forlorn cherry remains, although last year's late snowfall took out one of its main branches. The tree no longer bears fruit and is well into the process of decay, but it is kept because of the enjoyment of watching tree creepers and nuthatches searching for insects in the crevices of its bark. It

Regardless of its rough and ready appearance, the grass provides plenty of opportunities to watch wildlife. In March, I spotted a grey squirrel raking up moss with its paws, gathering large bundles into its mouth, then scaling the trunk of our holly tree where a drey was in the making. He was up and down many times, busily working away at his task. Then I noticed a mistle

thrush collecting strands of moss in its beak. He, or she, disappeared into our large yew bush, clearly intent on nest-building too. Meanwhile, behind our house, in a steep sloping orchard grazed by sheep, jackdaws were also at work. These cheeky characters were standing on my ewes' backs shamelessly pulling out wool by the beakful, presumably preferring warm wool to line

their nests.

Soon, I shall look forward to seeing the ant tumps in the front grass attract the attention of green woodpeckers. These large birds employ long sticky tongues to slurp up myriads of ants. They are majestic creatures and so brightly coloured that they seem more suited to a tropical environment than to the homely surroundings of the Teme valley. But they love old meadows and old orchards which is why they are here.

Another exotic-looking character, which can be encouraged to thrive in a boggy patch of old grass, is the snakeshead fritillary. This lovely boxshaped flower is not native to Britain, but the jewelled petals which hang down from a slender stalk

add a curious beauty to grass in the early spring. A few years ago, inspired by seeing meadows filled with them in Oxford's Magdalen College grounds, I planted some bulbs in a persistently damp corner. They have thrived, despite being attacked by both pheasants and lily beetles, and they continue to multiply and enjoy the less-than-perfect conditions of my grass that is not a lawn.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at 7.30pm on Thursday 9th May at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall. We welcome Steve Woodison who will be inviting us to "Meet the owls" - he will be bringing his feathered friends to tell us all about them. Everyone is most welcome and it is just £3 on the door.
